June 9, 2010 I think you may be interested in my Dr. Mace story. . . I have my birth certificate which says that I was born May 10, 1944 at the Margaret Mace Hospital in North Wildwood and the attending physician was Dr. Margaret Mace. My 22 year old Father was in the Navy during the war and his ship was at the Philadelphia Ship Yard. My 19 year old Mother came to live with him between tours on the Pacific. During the war my parents lived at 247 Grant Ave. in Cape May where many Sailors & GIs were given rooms. I was born during this short period. None of my family has ever lived in Cape May before or since.

I had always assumed since my parents were kids and had no money and that Dr. Mace was a midwife who delivered children for soldiers who had no money. I couldn't have been further from the truth. I found the article from your paper on the internet and it cemented a life long desire to see where I was born and where my parents lived. I look forward to meeting you on July 19.
