 $\mathcal A$ short time ago I was listening to a "aolden oldies" station and came upon a song written and recorded by American country singer Roger Miller. Chug-A-Lug was recorded in 1964, and the lyrics included "Grape wine in a Mason jar" and the discovery of a big old barn where "we uncovered a covered-up moonshine still". While the song was a humorous reminiscence of youthful encounters, it was reminiscent of an actual time that took place in these United States called Prohibition and The Wildwoods were dry or so they were supposed to be. In October, 1919, Congress passed the National Prohibition Act; the legislation was more commonly known as the Volstead Act. Both federal and local government struggled to enforce Prohibition over the course of the 1920s, but Wildwood's harbors and shoreline made it a bootlegger's dream.

In a 1982 article from the Atlantic City Press, a local builder and club owner, Ben Lauriello purchased a wooden building at 501 Montgomery Avenue in Wildwood. While he was tearing out a wall, he found two rubber hoses. He traced the hoses up through the wall until they ended underneath two 1926 newspapers. Under the newspapers he found a copper tank wrapped in burlap. The tank is reportedly a remnant of the building's heyday as a speakeasy and brothel. Local sources reported to the Atlantic City Press that Lauriellos building had once housed a speakeasy called Chester Dick's Harbor Inn.

Lauriello eventually found two copper tanks embedded in the wall. The tanks were used to hide illegal whiskey from federal and state agents. Proprietors of the establishment apparently funneled whiskey into the hidden tanks from the attic. The hoses ran to the first floor, where customers presumably filled their glasses. The copper tank on display at





the museum has a series of puncture holes in it. In my conversation with Ben Lauriello, it was explained to him that they were bullet holes made by agents during a raid. They would know about these concealed tanks and fire at the walls looking for them.

According to Stanley Gage of the Wildwood Crest Historical Society, at that time, "Wildwood was a pretty wild, open town during the 1920s." Boats rendezvoused with mother ships to bring illegal Canadian whiskey into the harbors, which were ringed with speakeasies. Like many speakeasies of the day, Chester Dick's Harbor Inn was also reportedly a brothel.

In reviewing some verbal history made by the late Mayor Doris Bradway who served as Mayor of Wildwood from 1933 to 1938, she fired the entire police department during the prohibition period. She claimed they were bringing in the booze and one detective had a "stable of girls". In searching her memory, she recalls the old houses of Cedar Avenue that had 4 and 5 story houses, some of which served as brothels and "maybe a saloon or two in there." The detective did business with someone that reported it to the mayor and she had the girls brought in and they said "Sure!" It seems he was supplying the women for the men, and men for the women, so she fired him. According to the Bradway tapes, the police detective took her to court, but "they didn't put him back because the court said I was right." In the meantime, the rest of the police were doing everything they could to undermine her authority.

Admittedly, a lot of Wildwood's history is a bit "colorful" to say the least, but, it seems the federal government came to its senses and in early 1933, Congress adopted a resolution proposing a 21st Amendment to the Constitution that would repeal the 18th. It was ratified by the end of that year, bringing the Prohibition era to a close. government closed down the fifth largest industry in the U.S. - alcohol production - and just handed it to criminals - a pretty remarkable thing to do."

Ever heard of Boo Boo Hoff? No? Affection for bow-ties aside, you won't find him at Jellystone Park but that's where I come in.

Known as the "King of Bootleggers," Hoff built quite an empire for himself in the Philadelphia area during Prohibition. Valued at a whopping \$5 million dollars (over \$85 million circa pre-pandemic 2020 figures), the liquor ring was larger than that of even Al Capone when it collapsed in October 1931, at which time the Philadelphia Inquirer reported agents uncovered the following:

- · 12 outlaw radio stations
- 6 rumrunning boats
- · 2 cutting plants

• 1 massive warehouse in Delaware County, PA (with 2 smaller ones in NY and Atlantic City)

• And a partridge in a pear tree

But Hoff didn't act alone. Wildwoods' own, J. Frank Hilton, played a key role in orchestrating behind-the-scenes transactions and distribution.

The eldest son of Anglesea founder Augustus "Gus" Hilton, Frank got his start working at one of the family's many island businesses, Consolidated Fisheries. Located on Ottens Harbor, having the plant and ice house next to the railroad made for faster, fresher shipping of both fish and liquor.

The process was simple and straightforward, operating under the same

premise businesses today consider wholesale. Known as Rum Row, supply ships from outside the U.S. anchored themselves three miles off the coast. Courier boats would then fill their holds with sacks of liquor and land at drop points such as Two Mile Beach, Hereford Inlet, and Higbee Beach (in Cape May).


From there, the booze was loaded onto trucks and delivered to either local warehouses or cutting plants, where it was modified by adding harsh chemicals before rebottling. Ordered liquor was then distributed to various operations within the ring. In Philadelphia, these included Hoff's 21 Club, Picadilly Club, and Sylvania Hotel. Among Wildwood venues were the Dew Drop Inn, and Tangerine Cafe, both of which happened to be located on Ottens Harbor.


The sea was an integral part of their Irish family, who emmigrated to West Philadelphia from Donegal.





The Remarkable Mrs. Bishop By Carolyn Mee, PhD

ometimes the person who doesn't expect any special accolades is exactly the person who so richly deserves them. One such person is North Wildwood's own Mrs. Margaret (Peggy) Bishop.

While Mrs. Bishop is a very accomplished woman, she may also be one of the most modest you'd ever meet. When asked about being interviewed for this story, she laughed and said, "I don't know that anyone wants to read about me. I never did anything great." But many of us whose lives were changed for the better for having known Mrs. Bishop would disagree.

Let's find out a little about her.

Mrs. Bishop's childhood is one that many readers in the Wildwoods can

relate to. Peggy Patterson grew up in the Wissinoming section of Philadelphia. As a young girl, she attended the Henry W. Lawton Elementary

School, and after that, she made lifelong friends at Frankford High School, a family tradition, as many of her relatives were also Frankford Pioneers.

Every summer was spent in the Wildwoods. As a teenager, she spent much of her time working at Baker Brothers 5 & 10 on Pacific Avenue and The Sandbox Luncheonette. During the school year, she often took the bus to Wildwood on weekends and stayed with friends, because what teenager doesn't want to be "down the shore" with friends?

Meanwhile, the Bishop family was settling into North Wildwood. Louis (Looty) Bishop, was the first of the Bishops to move here from Camden. He owned and operated Bishop's Cafe at Walnut and Olde New Jersey Aves. His brother William purchased the Germantown Hotel, later Bishop's High Steps, and now Anglesea Pub. On Valentine's Day 1920, the brothers' nephew, Louis (Lou) Bishop, who was to become the love of Peggy's life, was born on the second story of the High Steps where the family lived.

After graduating from Wildwood High School in 1940, Lou went into the Army. He served extraordinarily well becoming a decorated veteran of WWII. He served in the Army 44th Infantry Division, spending the war years in Europe.

Then, the war was over. And in early summer 1951, Peggy and Lou met at Walnut Avenue House on Olde New Jersey Avenue (now Exit 6), which at the time was owned by Louis Bishop's brother.

On a lovely autumn day, Nov. 1, 1952, Peggy and Lou married at the

Wissinoming Methodist Church. Peggy had bought her lace wedding gown and "all the trimmings" at Silverman's on South Street in Philadelphia. After the reception in a local catering hall, the couple took the train to Washington, D.C. where they enjoyed a weeklong honeymoon, touring all the sights of the capitol city, like the Smithsonian Museum.

When they returned, they set up their home on First Avenue where they lived their whole married lives, and where Peggy lives to this day. In 1958, they were blessed with a son Louis; then in 1964, a second son, Timothy.

Both were born at Burdette Tomlin Memorial Hospital in Cape May Court House and both attended Margaret Mace Elementary School and Wildwood High School. Peggy was a stay-at-home mom till they went to school. And then, with a little time on her hands, she began working at jobs that would improve others' lives.

Peggy spent many hours working for organizations designed to raise funds for the local Republican Party, like the Cape May County Republican Women's Association and the New Jersey Federation of Republican Women.

From 1979 to 1981, Peggy was a vocational counselor for the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA), a federal program designed to match clients with companies for temporary jobs that would hopefully become permanent positions. Peggy's job was to assess candidates' abilities to perform jobs for various employers. In 1981 the program was phased out, but Peggy went on to other important work.

She was a charter member of the Wildwood Chapter of the Deborah Hospital Foundation that raised funds to support the hospital so patients never had to pay for their treatment.

More recently, Peggy is best known for her work on North Wildwood City Council. She served briefly in the 1990s, and then after a hiatus, she was elected again in 2011. On Jan. 3, she was sworn in for her sixth term. Over the years she's served on many committees. Currently she serves on the Public Safety Committee that recently installed new police officers and firefighters.

Through the years, Peggy and Lou were also active in the Greater Wildwood Elks Lodge #1896. Sadly, her husband Lou passed away in 2018. Still, these days Peggy continues her active support of the Elks' projects.

Their two sons are college grads who went into government jobs. Louis works in the Labor Department and Timothy worked as a probation officer. She's also very proud of their two grandkids: a grandson who is a respiratory therapist and a granddaughter who is a buyer for Spencer Gifts.

Asked what--among her many accomplishments--she's most enthusiastic about, she answered, "The work the Elks have done on the Elks Veteran's Committee," for example, buying a special wheelchair for a disabled child, and helping vets in their transition to civilian life.

And she stays active in all the City's events. In December, she attended the North Wildwood Christmas Tree Lighting, then quickly drove to Wildwood to represent the City on a float in the Wildwood Christmas Parade.

Asked what she's looking forward to this year, ever smiling she said, "My next birthday! Seriously, I always look forward to the next day. When I wake up, I'm always glad I have another day."

So are we, Mrs. Bishop. So are we!

The "W" Tree Song

The oddly twisted piece of timber is the only existing remnant of Wildwood's famous "W" Tree, ages older than the city itself and symbolic of the primeval forest which inspired the resort's name. Our tree, an American Holly of magnificent beauty, was growing between what is now Pine and Wildwood Aves., {where the Wawa is today.} The island then was a wild stretch of sand dunes blanketed by a dense vine-tangled jungle in which strangely formed hollies abounded. Early settlers gave the hollies names, the most famous being the "W" tree, so named because as a sapling, its limbs had been lashed by the savage winds of Atlantic storms into an almost perfect W. For years the tree grew undisturbed, occupying a warm spot in the hearts of Wildwood residents and visitors. On a sunny August day in 1890, President Benjamin Harrison, while visiting Wildwood, insisted his photograph be taken by the tree.

For many years the area surrounding it was maintained as Magnolia Park, with the "W" tree as its feature attraction. When eventual development forced removal of the tree, it was placed in front of the Baker Bros. Office. Later it found its way to City Hall, and when the boroughs of Holly Beach and Wildwood were consolidated in 1912, a picture of it was incorporated into the city seal. The Wildwood Historical Society moved this remnant of the venerable tree from City Hall to the Museum in April 1990 where it is on permanent display.

When walking on Wildwood's famous Boardwalk, and you look onto the beach area on Widwood Avenue, there are 10 concrete pads with big yellow circles painted on them. And one may wonder, "What are those for?" Every year, beginning the day after Father's Day in June, mibsters from across the country converge on these rings to play a simple game that does not require modern day electronics, but old-fashioned skill and precision – Marbles!

The 2022 National Marbles Tournament returned after a two-year hiatus to Ringer Stadium in Wildwood, and ended with Jessica Johnson of the Cape May County Marbles Team claiming the championship title. Johnson defeated her teammate, Evelyn Merino, 8-5 in games of Ringer to become the first ever marbles champion from New Jersey to grab the top spot in the 99-year history of the National Marbles Tournament.

In the boys' side of competition, Cape May County's Marco Juarez was runnerup to this year's winner, Todd Kmiecik of Middletown, MD. Both of the winners will each receive \$2,000 scholarships to go towards their college educations.

This year's tournament was also historic because it was the first time that six (6) local players finished in the top 16 players out of the field of 34 players who came from all over the country. Three (3) girls placed in the top eight (8) – Johnson, Merino and Wildwood's Sarai Salas, and the same for their male counterparts – Juarez, Samuel Santiago (Cape May County) and Rasheem Jones (Wildwood).

The Cape May County and Wildwood Marbles teams are coached by Betty Harshaw and Jerry Sieber.

Sean Carragher's Lucky Day 🗱

His jaw collapsed after finding a travel itinerary tucked beneath an envelope

• On October 20, 2022, Sean Carragher, 49-years-old, embarked on a week-long dream vacation alongside 73 travelers, accompanying the McMullan family on their annual Ireland Adventure.

The McMullan's decade-long tradition was temporarily thrown off the rails due to the pandemic. The trip typically consists of regulars from Anglesea Pub visiting destinations such as Belfast, Donegal, and Galway.

One of those regulars is proud Wildwood resident Sean Carragher. On March 17, 2022, Carragher walked into work at Sand Jamm, located a few blocks away from his home. Carragher found it rather odd that both of his boss's daughters had their cars parked outside. Upon entering, he was greeted by a fourleaf clover and birthday balloons. Carragher, who isn't accustomed to receiving gifts, was stunned when the Mendel family handed him a birthday card with the itinerary for his Ireland trip.

"I'm speechless, I'm excited. I'm a little nervous at the same time. I've never flown over the ocean before but, I just can't wait for it," said Carragher at the time. When he's not supervising the staff, inventory products or printing out barcode labels as a manager at Sand Jamm by day, he can be found taking brisk evening walks at the North Wildwood Seawall trail. Streaming tunes by Jimmy Buffett or Bob Marley while enjoying a slice of pizza and watching dogs chase one another at the Wildwood Dog Park was once a distant reality.

Nearly two decades ago, Carragher made it his goal to live at the Jersey Shore. Since birth, the Massachusetts native and his family spent afternoons staring at amusement rides like the Jumbo Jet, Star Wars and Kong from the beach. Carragher, his two older brothers and cousins returned to shower at a house they'd spend a week at provided by his grandmother's friend. Evenings were spent at Surfside Pier.

Carragher's sacred childhood memories began slipping away in 1983, however, when his family cut back on expenses to purchase a new house. "We didn't go to Disney World, our vacation was Philly, but Wildwood was the thing you couldn't wait for," said Carragher, who experienced a "Wildwood drought" while building the foundations to his present-day reality, still thirsty for those Wildwood days even after graduating from the University of Massachusetts in 1995.

After tiresome days, Carragher returned home, reminiscing on his childhood while browsing through the Wildwood365 web page as well as reading each copy of The Sun by the Sea. That fascination with Wildwood built up over the years, leading him to revisit in 2006. The memories came flooding back, planting the idea to move to Wildwood full time. "It was just unbelievable. I don't know If I can put it into words, but when you're a kid it's just a fantasy land here." After eleven years of hustling, Sean Carragher is living his dream of proud Wildwood resident, with a trip to Ireland all part of the package.

Every time my family drove over the bridge to North Wildwood, NJ, my dad would roll down the window, take in a deep breath of bay funk and announce, "It feels good to be back."

From the time I was five years old, I lived with my grandmother and brother every summer at 411 E. 7th Avenue. My grandparents have owned it since my dad was sixteen years old. My parents would join us every weekend. Although I was born in Philadelphia, I feel as though I truly grew up in North Wildwood.

This past summer was the first summer that I didn't make the trip to the Jersey shore because of my work schedule, preparing to leave for the University of Delaware and spending time with my parents at our new house on Fenwick Island. I miss my grandparent's classic seashore house and North Wildwood, but I know that I will carry my Wildwood Days with me forever.

Anglesea Fisherman Heroes for the Five Mile Beach Sun

n the very early morning hours of Wed. Sept. 16, 1903, Delaware Capt. Ebe Townsend Chandler was piloting his vessel, the Spartan, up the Delaware Bay. The Spartan was a sturdy ocean going steam tug of 243 tons. It had been contracted to tow coal barges back and forth between Philadelphia and New England. On this trip there were 3 barges being towed, with a crew of 15, including the Captain, manning the Spartan.

It was a while before daybreak when a ferocious storm suddenly converged on the Spartan without warning. Later to be referred to as "The Vagabond Hurricane", it left a path of destruction all along the Mid Atlantic states, including many shipwrecks, flooding, destroyed buildings and loss of life. Torrential rain and 80 mph wind swept seas pounded and tossed the vessels like mere toys. Capt. Chandler had no time to search for a safe harbor, his only option being to drop anchor and try to ride out the storm. The anchor proved no match against the immense power of the storm and the tug with the three barges tethered behind, were pulled aground on the treacherous Brown Shoal, about mid-way center of the Bay. The Captain knew that a ship aground in a storm such as this is almost certainly doomed. The increasingly battered Spartan quickly began taking on water and in an effort to at least save his own ship, he ordered the tow lines cut. It was no use though. The Spartan was sinking and would have to be abandoned.

The Capt. barked for everyone to get their life vests on and launch the life boat. Before the crew could evacuate though, several huge waves washed every man overboard. Captain Chandler had not even had time to put on his life vest. The men struggled in the darkness and churning sea to grab on to any debris that might help them stay afloat.

The deafening wind, heavy rain and rising and falling swells made it impossible for the men to stay together or communicate. They quickly drifted apart, each to his own fate and probably with a prayer on their lips, as the Spartan was turned into drift wood.

At the very same time at the mouth of the Bay, about 5 miles off Cape Henlopen, the 42' fishing sloop Irene, out of Anglesea, was also in the grips of the storm. Her Captain, John Leonard Carlberg, also had no other option but to drop anchor and ride out this storm that came out of nowhere. The anchorage held fast at first but soon the Irene was also being dragged away by the tempest. A huge wave washed one lifeboat overboard and stoved in the other. The only other boat remaining was a small 12' dory, useless for the crew to escape to.

The anchor finally grabbed and held fast. By 9am there seemed to be a brief lull in this fast moving storm (maybe the eye of the Hurricane) and the Captain decided to carefully reset sails and try to slowly limp back to Anglesea. In short time however, he noticed two forms in the distance bobbing up and down with the swells. It was two of the survivors from the Spartan. Without a moments hesitation the Capt. changed course to go to their rescue. In fear of running them over, he laid anchor a safe distance away from them. The only way he could get them safely on the Irene would be to send out the little dory. He really needed a small member of his crew to do this and 21 year old Carl Aspenberg, stepped forward to volunteer. At only 130 lbs, he was very small in weight and stature but certainly strong and brave in spirit to leave the safety of his own boat to row a dinghy out in a hurricane.

Carl got to the exhausted men one at a time, but for fear of upsetting the boat by them struggling to climb aboard, he had them hang unto the stern while he rowed them back. When the rescued men, Carl and the boat were safely on board the men said there were 13 others that had abandoned the Spartan with them. Captain Carlberg braved the storm again searching a 12 mile radius for any survivors. One by one he was finding more and by noon 8 more men had been rescued. That made a total of 10 men saved from the Spartan. Five more, including Capt. Chandler, were no where to be found.

It was 12 noon, and all hope being given up, Capt. Carlberg set course for their home port of Anglesea, arriving there about 4pm. The exhausted, soaked, hungry and injured Spartan crew members were transferred to the Anglesea Life Saving Station, near Hereford Inlet Lighthouse, where they were given first aid, warm clothes and a hot meal. The next day there was some great news. Miraculously, two of the missing crew members, Capt. Chandler and his first mate, were picked up in the Bay by pilot boat Philadelphia. They had been in the water for 16 hours, the Capt. clinging to a 12' board the entire time. They were both taken to the port of Lewes Delaware for medical treatment and care. Unfortunately, the remaining three had perished.

The bravery exhibited in this rescue made the newspapers Nationwide, including the New York Times. The crew of the Irene were celebrated in Cape May County as local heroes. Letters of request went to President Teddy Roosevelt and members of Congress to award Captain Carlberg and Carl Aspenberg the Congressional Life Saving Medal. This silver medal is usually reserved for members of the U.S. Life Saving Service. Despite the Captains insistence that he did not want to be honored for just doing his humanly duty, enough influential people made it happen.

On January 5, 1906, both brave mariners were awarded this medal. Engraved on the back



was born August 11, 1941 in a 2-bedroom bungalow at 116 W. Poplar Ave., in Wildwood, and have lived and worked here ever since. Growing up in Wildwood during the 40s and 50s was wonderful. It was the best of all worlds! We had the beach, boardwalk, bay, summer friends, winter friends, and lots of opportunities for young people to earn spending money. We collected used magazines, newspapers and various kinds of junk metal and pulled it in our wagons to Snyder's Junk Yard about a mile away on W. Montgomery Ave. to earn a few dimes, or perhaps a quarter if you were lucky enough to have some copper or brass. We mowed lawns, washed windows, shoveled snow, shined shoes, turned in deposit bottles, checked phone booth coin returns, ran errands for neighbors, and for a time, I filled and carried coal buckets in and out every day for a neighbor during the heating season. We

did anything we could do to earn some spending money, inasmuch as most of us got little or no allowance. In those days if you wanted something you had to earn enough money to buy it.

At 12, we were old enough to get a newspaper route. When school let out, I got a Phila. Evening Bulletin route. My older brother already had a route and had proven to Jack Campbell, the man in charge of assigning routes and supplying the newspapers, that he was honest and reliable, so he took a chance on me. At 14, my brother obtained 'working papers' and got a 'real' summer job, so I took over his route along with my own. A few months later a neighborhood friend gave up his route and I took on that one as well, making it three Evening Bulletin routes from 26th to Pine Ave., from New Jersey Ave. to the Bay, which I worked until the summer I turned 15. I had obtained working papers the previous summer, but only worked five mornings a week at Morton's Restaurant on Wildwood Ave. before delivering the Bulletin in the afternoons. Morton's some years later became the Alton Motel and The English Grill. The following two summers, 1956 and 1957, I worked at the famous GROFF'S. At 17, I graduated from Wildwood High in 1958.

Dick Clark replaced Bob Horn for the teen dance program, Bandstand, on a Philadelphia TV station and during the summer of 1957 on most nights, Clark would travel to Wildwood to host it at the Starlight Ballroom. ABC TV picked up Clark's show, renamed it American Bandstand, and as stated in Wikipedia, "the first national broadcast of American Bandstand was filmed in the Starlight Ballroom in Wildwood, NJ" on August 5, 1957. It was a big deal!

There were two other record hops in Wildwood. One was at the roller rink on the

2nd floor of a building at the west end of the Casino Arcade at Cedar and Atlantic Aves. The other, was a much lesser known record hop in the auditorium of the OLD Wildwood Convention Hall which was located on the ocean side of the Boardwalk between Spencer and Youngs Ave., which is now the location of Morey's Adventure Pier. That record hop was hosted by me and my friend, Louie Conley. Well, not exactly 'hosted', but we sat on the stage, spun the 'top 40' records, and took requests.

1957 was the summer of "Whole Lotta Shakin' Goin' On" by Jerry Lee Lewis, and that little known enterprise was a venture, or I should say mis-adventure, taken by my father and a good friend of his, Ed Norris, who was an electrician in Wildwood Crest and an expert in sound systems and lighting. The sound system Ed installed was amazing, and he had somehow wired hundreds of small lights which hung down above the dancers' heads. They looked like stars in a night.

It was my understanding that a fellow named Turc Duncan, a longtime wrestling promoter, had for many years leased the hall for his Saturday night wrestling matches, which were quite popular at the time, leaving the auditorium empty the other six nights. When my father and Ed Norris leased those other six nights a week they had no knowledge of the formidable competition they would be facing that particular year. We couldn't operate our record hop on Saturday nights, the busiest night of the week because of the wrestling matches. Nevertheless, Sunday thru Friday nights we averaged at least 100 persons, but, in that cavernous space, didn't look like much more than a small gathering. But the kids that came loved it, and most kept coming back night after night. The record hop that summer was a

financial bust, but the venture was saved from being a total loss by the one-night appearance of Bill Haley and his Comets. How my father and Ed Norris secured that booking I'll never know, as I had never asked, but if I were to speculate, I would think Turc Duncan most likely had something to do with it, he was, after all, a promoter. Bill Haley and his Comets "Rock Around the Clock" became the biggest selling rock and roll single in the history of the genre and retained that position for many years. Bill Haley and his Comets were at the height of their popularity in 1957 and for that one night, the place was packed! Ticket sales paid the act and our concession stand sales provided a small profit for the night and for the summer. My father and Ed Norris took on a second location which they operated over the summers of 1957 and 1958 in Cape May City in a unique building on Beach Drive which in the early 1950s had been occupied by the Cape May County Art League. When I tried to find any record of it for this writing, while I failed to do so, I found similar buildings that have been preserved in other locations and learned that they were built to house merry-gorounds. Perhaps that is what it had been built for in Cape May. That Cape May dance location, although much smaller, being the only record hop in town, did much better than the Wildwood location, which ended with the 1957 season.

The summer of 1958, having graduated high school, taken on a full-time job, and with no record spinning duties, ironically, I spent most nights at the Starlight Ballroom. Dick Clark had become a HUGE national personality and therefore in 1958 he would appear at the Starlight Ballroom only sporadically on weekend nights. No matter, on one fine Wildwood summer night I met and danced with a beautiful girl. Her name was Rhoda and she was there with several of her girlfriends from Wildwood Crest. Our first dance was to the Tommy Edwards hit "It's All in The Game". A few weeks later she became my steady girl, and three and a half years later, she became my wife. In January 2022 we celebrated our 60th wedding anniversary and are enormously proud of our two children, David & Lauren, and our five grandchildren. Thank you, Wildwood, NJ for a truly wonderful life so far.

PORT\ROYAL\MEMORIES



Father & son, Will & Jack Morey, Moreys Resorts y earliest memories of the Wildwoods is the Port Royal. I always viewed it as a "grand dame" of Wildwood Hotels. It had the perfect view of the catamaran races and an awesome pool and game room.

My Grandparents stayed at the Jolly Roger which I believe was also part of the same ownership at the time. My Godparents stayed at the Nomad down the block. The Nomad had the best waffles and ice cream because the ice cream was a solid block frozen on dry ice. It melted perfectly under the hot waffle as the moonlight and the lights of the Port Royal glowed in the distance. We went back in through the hotel garage because I thought it was the coolest thing I had ever seen.

Way back in the 1980's, we didn't need laws to tell us not to discrimiate against disabled people. We didn't even need a chair lift beside every hotel pool. We had fathers. I couldn't have been older than seven because I had no siblings at the time My dad just finished playing with me in the deep end of their pool. He asked me to get out and gave me to my mother. I thought it was because the big kids wanted to use the diving board.

While I was being greased with sunscreen chemicals burning my eyes, I turned around, cleared my eyes only to see another hotel guest rolling up to the concrete stairs of the Port Royal pool with his wife. The distinctive red logo of Everest and Jennings jumped out amongst the sun reflecting on the perfect polished chrome of the wheelchair. As he was rolling up, my Dad, and a man from New York named Angelo Toronto, who stayed in the room

next to ours every year, and about five other Dads helped the man in the pool. The hotel lifeguard led the operation to make sure it was done safely. After the job was done, people went back to their vacation.

It was a memory I'll never forget because the guests and staff were so kind and compassionate. No one dared take a picture or film the dads being dads. I never said a word about it until now and to mark the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the hotel. I was left with immense pride in my father and what it really meant to be a father myself. Memories from the Port Royal are not just reasons to smile, they serve as a guide post on my journey as a father.

One of the greatest joys came true for me when I got to bring my own daughter to the Port Royal on its 48th season on 2020. She and my wife joined me in the same pool where I first saw my dad as a hero all those years ago. To see my mother in law, a die hard Ocean City loyalist, convert to a lover of the Wildwoods was a great moment that, through the love of a husband for his dad and later his wife, two families, instead of just one, fall in love with the Wildwoods and all because of the Port Royal.

Happy Anniversary to the Way and Morey families on 50 great years of Wildwood hospitality like no other.

Mary's Wildwood Memories ~ Old & New submitted by Mary Fulginiti Litrenta

I always look forward to reading the Sun. I especially enjoy the stories of multigenerational families and their memories of vacationing in the Wildwoods. There is a common thread among these stories. They focus on their families, and you can weave your own stories into them. We all share the same love of being in the Wildwoods, no matter which section, street, or beach. My Wildwood story starts way before I was born. My mom's dad took his family to Wildwood in 1929. His wife and six children would take the train from Philadelphia to a boarding house on Rio Grande Avenue in Wildwood. There the seeds were planted in my mom that began her love affair with the shore. My mom always told me her father wanted to purchase a home there. Sadly his dream never became a reality because shortly after their Wildwood vacations began my grandmother died. His dream of owning a home died with her.

Time moved on and my mom married and started her family. Day trips were more common at that time in her life. Around 1950 my aunt and uncle with another couple purchased property on 19th street and the beach. There a small four apartment complex was built and my mom's North Wildwood story began. Every year as soon as school closed our family would go to the Pelican Apartments for two weeks and rent a one bed, one bath apartment. My mom's family grew and we were seven people in that tiny apartment. My parents shared their bedroom with me on a cot, my sister in the crib, two of my brothers on a pull out in the living room, and my third brother on an army cot in the kitchen. We thought it was heaven. The 1950's were a fun time to be at the shore. Our apartment was so close to the beach that my mom would wave her kitchen towel when it was time

to go home for dinner. High tide came in under the boardwalk and my sister and I would sit on these short pilings that lined the beach. There was just one house between the apartments and the beach. That property later became the site of the Buccaneer Motel.

Because my relatives rented all the apartments for 2 weeks, I grew up with my cousins on the beach. We would go on the boardwalk and walk to Howard Johnson's Ice Cream to see what new flavor was being served. As much as I would have loved to get pizza on the boardwalk that never happened. Both my parents were excellent cooks. My dad would stop at Jim's Clam Bar as soon as we came off the rickety bridge so he could buy clams for his clams & linguine. On the days that my dad and my brothers went crabbing, mom would have a pot of crabs and spaghetti on the table. My mom also loved to bake at the shore. She said it was something about the water. She made homemade pizza and donuts. The more family appeared at her apartment, the more she cooked.

Every year my uncle would load us kids into his car and drive to Wildwood Crest where we would see all the new motels that sprang up over the winter. They were all so unique with lights ablaze at night with their beautiful swimming pools. In the evenings we would walk to the Casino Arcade and ride the Wooden roller coaster, the Caterpillar, and go through the Fun House.

When I was young, I thought coming to North Wildwood from South Philly was like a breath of fresh air. The sky was so big, the streets so wide and the stars filled the sky. When I was a teenager in the mid-60's there was no place better than being in the Wildwoods. My friend and I would go on the boards and meet

kids from different high schools. We went to the Starlight Ballroom and danced the night away. It was around this time that the apartments, which now had expanded to six units, were sold and the Malibu Motel was built. The apartments remained part of the complex and now we also had a pool. At 18 I started going to the shore with my cousin on the weekends. We would take the bus on Broad and Snyder and hoped it was the express to Wildwood. We stayed at a boarding house on 19th and Atlantic for \$5 a night and we ate Mack's pizza all day. Could life be any better!

My Wildwood story continues with my marriage in 1971. This began a new generation with my two daughters and their cousins now vacationing in the same apartments with their grandparents. Now my children had their cousins to play on the beach all day, go on the rides at night, and swim in the motel pool. They went to Hunts Pier, Dracula's Castle and Eds Funcade. My parents still rented an apartment, and my mom was still cooking. When my dad made his clams and linguine, and my mom her crabs and spaghetti, we would go with our pots into her kitchen and have our own take out. Sadly, the apartments were sold and the Malibu expanded. Our hearts were broken. What stood since 1950 was gone and so were our Wildwood days. My cousins and my brothers moved up the coast. They had houses in Stone Harbor, Avalon, Sea Isle, Ocean City and Longport. Wildwood was left behind. At times during our parties my brother would drag out the slide projector and we would all shout and scream with all our Wildwood memories. Our girls were grown. College, grad school, and medical school took up their time and other places were on their list for vacations. I thought this would be the end of my Wildwood story.

Until one beautiful winter day in December 2004 my husband and I stayed at a B&B in Cape May. I hadn't been to the Wildwoods in 20 years. We decided to take a ride since so much was happening there

with old motels gone and new condos being built. We saw a beautiful townhouse on 6th Ave. located one short block to the beach. We decided right then to purchase it. I think my family thought we were crazy, but I felt like I was coming home.

The year after we purchased our house our first grandchild was born. Shortly two more grandchildren completed our family. My grandchildren are the fifth generation coming to the Wildwoods. They are cousins spending time on the beach and going on some of the same rides their moms went on. So much of the boardwalk I knew is gone, but for this generation it doesn't matter because they are making their own memories. My grandchildren are all in high school now. I never regretted that day we decided to buy our house. We have been here for 18 summers, and my grandchildren never missed a summer on the beach. Things are different now. They have sports camps and jobs, but they have the same salt water in their veins as my mom and I did. My parents are long gone. I make the crabs and spaghetti now. But the kids go to Sam's pizza and get their donuts on the boardwalk. My grandfather never had his dream come true, but I did. And yes, we still watch those crazy slide shows and relive our own Wildwood days.

Thinking and fishing go well together

Hello and Welcome to Fish Story 2023, This article has two goals for you. Number one, if you had a great trip fishing take a second to relive it. Two, if you have not experienced a great fishing trip, I feel sorry that you have missed the opportunity. The oceans cover around two thirds of the world. Technically, you have missed the chance to explore that part of this world. Get excited and fire up the energy to get out and fish. The conversation with fellow anglers are unique. We come from all walks of life. All the problems in our world remain at the dock. The act of fishing brings out the best in people. Often anglers lose tackle. The stranger next to you usually offers to replace the tackle, sometimes it results into a friend for life. I Love the comradery that develops out on the water.

Sometimes I let my mind drift away from fishing as I can gaze at the wonderful backdrop of the combination of sea and sky provided by nature and the Almighty. The relaxation of fishing is a bonus for your health and personal spirit. I always enjoy the opportunity to encourage a youngster to experience the sport of fishing. We all have the responsibility to pass it on to them. I guarantee you will enjoy the day and feel humanity at its best. I know it helps us by allowing the problems in life to go away for the day. The excitement and drama of a fish being reeled up brings back times like a young person. Reeling in a fish is like the unknown while opening Christmas gifts. The excitement and curiosity of what is going to come to the surface as you continue to reel faster. I confess that netting a keeper flounder gives me a smile, knowing one of the best meals you can have soon with the family. The ticket to success when you start fishing is to gather all the information you can receive from any experienced Anglers. Most are willing to give you the latest information and what will work today. You must learn all you can about the species you are pursuing. Understanding about their ways of feeding and surviving

during the season. The fishing seasons are influenced by many issues like Wind, Tidal changes, and what bait is available for the fish to feed daily.

SUMMER 2023

Since this will be the only issue of The Sun this year, I will try to cover the monthly expectation of what seasons are open during the summer and fall. I recognize certain species by certain times of the year. May and June will start a unique smorgasbord for most anglers. Flounder is in shallow waters of the back bay searching for warmer water. They will be spawning for the future. As the water warms up to high, they will find different areas for the bait and water comfort. Flounder will bite from June to September in the back bays. Drum fish will continue in Delaware Bay to the end of June. After their spawning they will return to the deep ocean. Weakfish, Bluefish, will search for structures like Jetties, bridges, and shoals in the Delaware Bay. The ocean starts to have Flounder and Seabass on structures like the artificial reefs. They will stay in various areas off the beaches until the water cools off and chases them offshore. Flounder Season closes at the end of September. Seabass fishing reopens thru the Fall with good catches but regulations can have some closing periods. Stripers usually appear in the fall heading sound on their migration. Unfortunately, in the past couple of years they have arrived at late December. Check with the many bait shops for the latest information on When, Where, and How the fish can be caught. Party and Charter boats will continue to run through the fall. Lots of videos on Youtube can show how the pros catch the many species out there waiting for you.

How blessed we are to live next to one of the greatest wonders of the world! Don't miss the chance to experience this wonderful ocean wilderness and relive those memories for ever.

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

HEREFORD INLET LIGHTHOUSE

On June 10, 1872 Congress approved funding to construct a much needed lighthouse on the Hereford Inlet at the Northeast end of the Five Mile Beach Island. The 1.5 acre of land was sold to the U.S. Govt. on July 7, 1873 for a whopping price of \$150. It was purchased from Humphrey S. Cresse, who was among one of the many Mayflower descendants living offshore in Cape May County. He owned much of the Anglesea section of the island.

Construction began on the uninhabited barrier island on November 8, 1873 and was completed on March 30, 1874. In just 4 short months, the magnificent Hereford Inlet Lighthouse beacon was lit for the **first** time on May 11, 1874. This is the **first** known photograph and can be seen hanging inside the Lighthouse today. Early Anglesea settlers sought shelter here during many horrific storms. Also, the island's **first** religious services were held in the Lighthouse parlor.

John Marche was appointed the **first** Keeper of the Light. Unfortunately after only three months on the job, Keeper Marche drowned when his small boat capsized on a return trip from the mainland.

The job of Lighthouse Keeper was a very important position to hold in the 19th century. Human lives and valuable ships and cargo depended on a vigilant, capable and trustworthy person. Someone with these qualities along with a seaman's resume is what the government was looking for in a replacement. On September 28, 1874, Freeling Hewitt became the new Lighthouse Keeper. He and his wife Abbie took a big leap when they left their Cape May Court House home to live in the lighthouse. They were, at that time, the only permanent residents on the island. The Keepers' pay at Hereford Lighthouse in 1874 was \$450. per year.

Threatened by the encroachment of the south side of Hereford Inlet, its foundation was damaged in a severe storm on August, 1913. As a result the lighthouse was moved inland (150 feet to the west) where it still shines brightly today.

Wildwood Firsts

HEREFORD INLET LIFESAVING STATION

The first Lifesaving Station in 1850 in the vicinity of 1st & Surf Ave. The Federal Government placed a small lifesaving station here, which housed a lifeboat and essential supplies for persons involved in shipwrecks. Hereford Inlet Lifesaving Station No. 36 was built in 1871 and in 1888 a more modern one was built next to the Lighthouse. The US Coast Guard took over and built what is now the NJ Marine Police Building in 1938.

Before trains, automobiles and planes, the ocean was the main highway for transportation. There were at least 60 shipwrecks documented in Hereford Inlet between 1766 to the early 1900's. The majority of wrecks were southbound vessels and involved the coastal Schooner, A.K.A., the "Allied Van Lines" of its day, which transported all types of bulk cargo up and down the coast. Ships sailing at night or in foggy weather often ended up running aground and battered to pieces by the breakers. This was one of the main reason for the construction of the Hereford Lighthouse in 1874.





THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF ANGLESEA The **First** Baptist Church of Anglesea at 3rd & Atlantic was the island's **first** church founded in 1898. This was their first church building after outgrowing the parlor of Hereford Lighthouse. This was replaced by another wooden building. The stained-glass window from the second building was preserved and placed in the front of the current brick building which was built in 1973.

In 1885, a Union Sunday School was the **first** organized church service held in the parlor of the Hereford Inlet Lighthouse, under Keeper Freeling H. Hewitt's care and supervision. The tiny congregation met in Hereford Light for 13 years until 1898.

Outgrowing the Hewitt's parlor, the congregation filed for incorporation and became a legally instituted body. A chapel was erected on a lot owned by Hewitt, then known as Third and Pennsylvania Aves. (3rd & Atlantic Aves. today)

Fifteen hundred and twenty-four dollars totaled the final cost of the chapel. Today, one chuckles at such an amount, but consider what \$1524. meant to fishermen and shipwrights in 1898!

The **first** settlers of Anglesea, hardy and conservative folk, knew the struggle against storm, driving wind, and making a living off the sea. Families needed care, children needed shoes, and everyone needed food and shelter. Life on a barrier island, thrust between sea and sky, was obscure and difficult.

Under its **first** Pastor, Alfred Chaplin, the original church building took shape. The original baptistery and stained-glass window can be seen today in the present building.

Little by little, the "Little Church with a Mighty God" grew and spiritual blessings flooded hearts and lives, spilling over into the community with gladness! Changed lives never fail to turn heads - not to the ones who have changed, but to the One who changed them.



Norman Wildwood Ryan was the **first** boy to be born in Wildwood in 1892. In honor of the occasion they gave him the middle name of Wildwood. Shown here with his sister Alta, (who may have been the **first** girl).



Baker Crest Thurber was the **first** baby born in Wildwood Crest, N.J. on September 9, 1906



In June 1895, Wildwood Borough Council appointed William Jack as the **first** Lamplighter at a salary of \$400. per year. The PA. Globe Gaslight Co. was contracted to install the gas street lights.



Elmer T. Pinker was born in 1879 in Philadelphia and graduated Pharmacy School in 1904 before finding his way to the island, where his father was building homes in Holly Beach. Elmer settled on Pine Ave. and opened Pinker's Pharmacy on the corner of Davis & Pacific, the island's **first** drug store.

"WHILE YOU WERE AWAY... " WILDWOOD HISTORIC MUSEUM HONORS PAST PRESIDENTS

Kooms at the city's historical museum telling stories of the Wildwoods' veterans, first responders, schools and athletes were dedicated to four past Wildwood Historical Society presidents at a ceremony Sunday, October 16, 2022.

Al Brannen and Larry Lillo, both of Wildwood, and Bob Scully and Anne Vinci, both of North Wildwood, were the honorees. Four plaques were presented, each bearing the name of a dedicated room, and all of which will be affixed to the entrance to their respective rooms.

"Every one of these people helped push the museum forward significantly," Brannen, an emeritus member, said after his plaque was revealed.

The current board told the four they would be honored but the dedication of rooms was a surprise that was revealed at the ceremony. "It was difficult to keep this a secret, but the payoff was worth it," said society president **Taylor Henry.** "The honorees were visibly moved that their many lifelong contributions to the historical society will forever be remembered, as their names will be permanently affixed to the museum."

About 50 people attended the ceremony, many of whom were family and friends of honorees. "While many of those who contributed to the historical society have passed away, it's important for us to celebrate those who are living," Henry said. "Al, Larry, Bob and Anne all deserve to know how much they matter and how much of an impact they've made in their lifetimes."



Al Brannen pictured with his wife Diane, is a US Coast Guard veteran responsible for reviving the previously inactive Wildwood Historical Society in the 1970s. After George Boyer, the founder and namesake of the museum died in 1976, there was no one to keep the society going until Brannen became president. The society under Brannen's leadership grew from a room of artifacts in city hall to the large building on Pacific Avenue that houses the museum today. Al served on the historical society in one capacity or another for the next several decades, finally retiring in 2021, yet still remains an integral part.

Because of his focus on preserving the stories of the islands' veterans and military members, the board dedicated the room about veterans as the Al Brannen Military Room.



Larry Lillo, pictured with his family, who currently serves as the society's secretary, is the longest-serving stillactive board member, having served since the 1970s. Lillo worked 25 years on the Wildwood Fire Department, including a time as Fire Captain. He was also a lifeguard with the Wildwood Beach Patrol.

In 1994, Lillo, a lifelong train enthusiast, opened Holly Beach Train Depot in the same Pacific Avenue building that housed his father's barbershop for over 70 years.

"To recognize his contributions to the city, the safety of its residents and visitors, and to this museum, the Wildwood Historical Society dedicates the First Responder Exhibit as the Larry Lillo First Responder Room," Henry said.





Emeritus member, Bob Scully, pictured with his family, began his time as president in the late 1990s, during which time he co-authored the book, "Wildwood by the Sea: The History of an American Resort." The Scully family goes back to the beginnings of the Wildwoods. Bob's grandfather Christopher J. Scully arrived in South Jersey in 1892 and founded a construction company that built such still-standing landmarks as St. Ann's Church, the 15th Ave. Firehouse in North Wildwood, and Wildwood Catholic High School. Bob graduated from the same school built by his relatives only a few years prior. A basketball player, he was chosen for the 1951 New Jersey All-State Parochial Quartet.

In honor of his legacy as a star athlete and alum of Wildwood Catholic, the Wildwood Historical Society dedicated the School and Sports Exhibit as the Robert J. Scully School and Sports Room.



Anne Vinci, pictured with her family, was the society's first woman president. She was responsible for starting the ongoing Commemorative Brick Program fundraiser, where personalized bricks are cemented into the walkway outside the museum.

By the late 2000s, the museum collection was again getting too large for the space in which it was contained. Under Vinci's leadership, the historical society undertook one of its largest and most challenging projects: construction of an addition in 2009. Vinci retired from the board in 2014 but continues to volunteer.

For her contributions to the growth of this museum, the addition she helped build was dedicated as the Anne Vinci Museum Annex.

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

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...as "Wildwood's first cereal-infused ice cream parlor and coffee bar" ... Guppi moves to a more spacious home at 3417 Pacific after a very successful first season three blocks north. It's a fitting spot in more ways than one, as owner Abby MacQueen started her sustainable surfwear company across the street at the Downtown Wildwood Farmer's Market in 2018... The south end of the block is now anchored by The Panini Cafe on Pacific, which takes over for the short-lived 3421 Island Grill. Co-owners Shawn McGuiaan and John Deluca of Northeast Philadelphia offer a wide variety of panini options and more for the breakfast, lunch and dinner crowds... What's "old" is new again at Old Movies By The Sea - no, we really mean it! This winter, Glenn Kingsbury and Karen Drew painstakingly revived the former Sea Theater (4005), which had several identities over the years but was originally a nickelodeon dating back to the 1910's. The location is back in business as a working theater and event-hosting venue, playing not just "old movies," but hosting comedy nights, sports presentations and more... Last year, the Marvis Diner expanded with a second location, transforming the former Star Diner & Cafe into the Marvis Pancake House & Diner (325 W. Spruce Ave). This year, the original diner at 4900 Pacific underwent a major renovation, adding a new outdoor dining patio and additional parking... Along with MudHen Brewing Co., Santorini and SOL have been widely acknowledged as two of the leaders of Wildwood's recent "restaurant renaissance." Both establishments opened in 2021 and now, interestingly, they operate under the same banner. Well, sort of. Earlier this spring, Santorini announced that SOL was being rebranded as Venezia, and would now operate as its "sister restaurant." Similar to the Mediterranean-themed Santorini, Venezia is an "Italian BYOB," replacing SOL's "Latin Fusion"-inspired menu and ambiance... Before we leave Wildwood and head down to the Crest for our final stop on the "While You Were Away" tour, let's make a quick stop at City Hall. At the parking lots directly to the north and south of the municipal building, massive new solar paneled shelters have been installed (similar to the addition at Morev's Piers' lot at Ocean & Juniper last year). This installation, which also includes new perimeter landscaping, is a key component of the city's "solar initiative" according to Mayor Pete Byron: "As a community, we will all reap the benefits of this." ... The owners of Brandon's Pancake House & Ice Cream Parlor display their mission statement on their sign: "BE KIND!" Inspired by their son Brandon, who lives with autism, Karl & Aimee Famiano have created a space where all can feel welcome, including families and those living with disabilities and other challenges. Their new eatery is located at 6200 New Jersey Avenue, at the previous home of the Doo Wop Drive-Inn. Meanwhile, the building's former proprietor, Jason Kramer, can be found slinging up specials back at his longtime home, the Tangiers Cafe (Tangiers Motel, 6201 Atlantic Ave)... Charlie's Sandwich Shop, a popular New York eatery with deep Italian roots, is set to breathe new life into the former Cresse Variety Store (vacant for the past five years at 5400 Pacific Ave). A staple in Brooklyn since 2016, the salumeria figures to be a unique addition to the Wildwoods' diverse and ever-growing culinary scene... You can't miss the BIG, vibrant new mural at 10th & New Jersey Avenue! "Raise the Bar" not only commemorates the rebranding of The Gym at 10th to Shore Fitness at 10th, but celebrates the gym's expansion and focus on inclusion.

"NEW & OLD BIZ"

Owners Stacie and Ron Tedesco purchased the longtime fitness center in 2022 and immediately implemented changes to bring it up to top industry standards. Along with continued updates, the new mural is representative of the Tedescos' dedication to community and the essence of the Wildwoods - "the 'Doo Wop' legacy, the sun, the sand and summer!"

... A Little Cafe (8700 New Jersey Ave) reopened under the direction of Chef Michael Ayoub in late 2022, and will now operate year round. Ayoub has reworked the menu, which will continue to feature sandwiches, salads, "from scratch" soups and baked goods, along with a full service coffee bar and an emphasis on vegan and gluten-free options... The much-anticipated Crest Arts Pavilion opened to the public on March 24 with an exhibition sponsored by the Wildwood Crest Creative Arts Council. The mixed-use venue will soon feature functional space for meeting and local organizations, hosting options for weddings and other special events, two dedicated retail areas, and more, in addition to space for displaying some of the Crest's historical artifacts.

Eva Basilio & Joseph Pettinelli purchased Rita's Deli in the winter of 2022 and opened Turtle Gut in July of last summer, a new specialty coffee + food spot in Wildwood Crest. Their mission is to provide a great cafe experience with coffee served from the best specialty roasters from around the world and fresh, excellent quality food from local Jersey farms, all while enjoying an amazing view of Sunset Lake. Their historical name is derived from Turtle Gut inlet, once located where Denver and Toledo Avenues are today. The inlet was filled in, merging Five Mile and Two Mile Beaches into one. There was also the famous Revolutionary War Battle of Turtle Gut that took place there in 1776 {You may search The Sun archives to read more on Turtle Gut.}

Historically speaking, Rita's Deli originally opened as a corner delicatessen and variety store, owned and operated by **Wildwood Crest Mayor Joseph** & Rita Von Savage in the 50s & 60s.



oldest establishments, **Eleanor's Gifts** at Oak Avenue, closed for the final time after the 2022 season. Owner Dan Kavounis will continue to operate his cabana and beach rentals business out of the location... Otaku House, specializing in anime and manga merchandise, has taken over the former location of Shooters Old Time Photos at 3414 Boardwalk (Pirates of the Wildwoods 3D Mini-Golf remains, with a number of improvements, next door)... Several years in the works, Capt'n Jack's Island Grill at the Boardwalk Mall is in the process of installing a second floor balcony that will overlook the Boardwalk and wrap around the Garfield Avenue side of the building... El Pilon Criollo at Roberts Avenue is a new Latin cuisine restaurant that takes over for Seaport Kettle Corn, which lasted one season. This is the former longtime home of the Grandview Gift Shop.

Morey's Newest Adventures

Even in years when they aren't introducing a major new ride or attraction, Morey's Piers always has an interesting project or two, or a surprise trick up its sleeves to WOW its guests. Last year's most impactful addition may have been the introduction of the Sunny the Seagull plush dolls, a premium gamestand prize that quickly became a local sensation (note the plethora of "impersonators" available at Boardwalk shops this summer).... The most obvious change this year is the completely revamped front of Adventure Pier, the first phase of a "food hall" concept introduced three years ago. Several structures and attractions were removed over the winter, including the Boat Tag game and existing Kohr Bros. building to make way for the arrival of several shipping containers. These compliments to the existing contain-

ers at artBOX and elsewhere on the pier, will serve as modules for food, games and more. At press time, containers were being prepped to house new Curley's Fries and Kohr Bros. locations. The concept should be an interesting one to watch unfold this summer, and in the years to come... Meanwhile, on Mariner's Pier, Jumbo's Grub & Pub has been rebranded as Founders Grub & Pub, as a nod to the individuals "who helped build Morey's Piers into the beloved destination it is today"... In true "outside the box" Morey's tradition, the family's biggest addition for 2023 isn't on the Boardwalk - or even in the Wildwoods at all! Over the winter, the organization acquired and set out and renovated Laguna Oaks Golf Course in Cape May Court House, transforming it into Big Little 9 - "The Happiest Golf Course on Earth!"

Around the Island

"Watch the... MOTEL, please??" What's more WILDWOOD than the Sightseer Tram Cars (which, incidentally, are celebrating their 75th anniversary season of operation this summer)? There are few contenders, though the island's famous collection of "Doo Wop" motels would have to figure high on a list of favorites. Thus, it was fitting when the new owners of the Aruba Motel decided to retheme and decided on "The Tram Car Motel!" Yes, after a total renovation, the motel was painted in the classic yellow and blue color scheme, and outfitted with classic tram car signage... In other motel news, the former LuFran Motel at 5106 Ocean Avenue, which has sat vacant for the past few seasons, has been fully renovated and revived as the Beach House... From South Philly to the Wildwoods: Antney's Grub was an instant hit and has garnered a loyal following since setting up...





shop at the aforementioned Aruba Motel in 2020. This year, owner Anthony Renzulli is expanding his operation in a big way, opening up additional eateries at 333 E. Montgomery in Wildwood (the former Bannon's Ocean Cafe) and at the Jolly Roger Motel in Wildwood Crest (taking over the Neverland Cafe)... Another City of Brotherly Love favorite, Steve's Prince of Steaks, will soon move into the previous home of Classic Sandwiches at 2701 New Jersey Avenue. Founded by Steven Iliescu in 1980, the original Steve's location is still going strong at Bustleton & St. Vincent in Northeast Philly... After the closure of the legendary Shamrock Cafe on Pacific Avenue, the equally-historic Kelly's Cafe (4400 Atlantic Ave) proudly proclaimed itself "Wildwood's oldest bar." That title lasted only one summer, as the venerable establishment was sold by longtime owners Victor & Patrice Namiotka over the winter. The new proprietors promptly emBARKed on a dramatic renovation of the property, transforming it into The Copper Dog. The name pays tribute to the owners' own copper dog, Vivian; and, as you might suspect, fourlegged friends are welcome at the restaurant's outdoor dining patio... It seems that Bagel Time Cafe and its owner, Angelo Bilios, find their way into this space every year. It's for good reason, as he's always up to something new! Last year, Bilios and his wife, Anna, acquired the Pink Cadillac Diner, adding it as Bagel Time's sister property. This year, they have made major changes to Bagel Time itself, including a full exterior renovation, adding a lounge area to the dining room and creating the "Bagel Yard" - colorfully revamped patio space- see photo of 'yours truly' peacing out by the vintage VW in the yard... Despite a fun, nostalgiabased presentation and an enthusiastic following, Nan & Pop's Kitchen

announced last fall that it was closing its doors after just two seasons. Enter Chef Stephen Quici, who has stepped out on his own and opened Stephen's Restaurant at the location this spring. Quici, a culinary wizard with over 40 years of professional cooking experience, is perhaps best known in the Wildwoods as the head chef at Duffinetti's Restaurant. He is now serving up his own breakfast and dinner specialties at the longtime former home of the Lobster Shack... The island's newest brewery, Anglesea Aleworks, made its longawaited debut in February at 3401 New Jersey Avenue. Featuring an extensive list of daily beers on tap as well as rotators/seasonals, the location immediately became a popular local gathering space for not only sampling but hanging out and discussing all things "beer"... Mallory's Eats, an artisan baking company that has become a favorite at local events and pop-ups (including the Downtown Wildwood Farmer's Market), now has a physical location. Owner Mallory Stetter has set up shop at 3012 Pacific Avenue, where she will craft and sell her custom desserts... The 3400 block of Pacific Avenue (directly across from Byrne Plaza) is once again at full occupancy, thanks to the addition of two new businesses and the relocation of another. Debuting on the row this year are Utterly Ice Cream, Guppi and The Panini Cafe on Pacific. They join The Cove in Wildwood, Hooked on Books, Blue Homes Real Estate, Maggie's Boutique and The Yellow Umbrella Gift Shoppe in rounding out Downtown Wildwood's most robust block of offerings ... Utterly, the creation of local entrepreneur **Danielle** Aydelotte, is the the next evolution of Clipper Dipper ice cream, which operated previously at the Yankee Clipper Motel in the Crest. Aydelotte describes the business... Read on!

If you have followed this column over the years, you are aware of the notion that CHANGE itself has become a reliable constant in the Wildwoods. Given the amount of the activity on the island this past offseason, along with the scope of several of the new developments in question, one has to wonder: Is 2023 the culmination of years of planning, promotion and investment in the Wildwoods, or the continuation of a trend that will see yet more largescale projects get the green light? Indications seem to favor the latter, but only ONE thing is for certain with so much going on and so many new things to talk about, we don't have the time or space for our usual long-winded intro!


So, let's dive right into what you might have missed "While you were away"...

The BiG Developments

Mayor Pete Byron called it "the biggest and most essential construction project" he can recall in the Wildwoods. When you stop to think about it, Phase II of the **Boardwalk Renova**tion Project directly impacted dozens of businesses, but had indirect consequences for the entire island, and beyond. This winter, the five-block stretch of Boardwalk Maple north to 26th Avenue was rehabilitated;

the project started last year when the three-block stretch from Oak to Maple was addressed. The project has sought to renovate and rehab sections of the promenade that are damaged from aging, weather and wear-and-tear with bolstered concrete pillars and fresh decking, in addition to new handrails, access ramps and lighting. If all goes according to plan, per Byron, Phase III will commence south of Schellenger Avenue this fall... There can be no denying the impact Philadelphia-based investment & development firm BG Capital has made on the island since the opening of Seaport Pier in 2018. This spring, the company's largest projects reach completion in the forms of the Seaport Suites in Downtown Wildwood and the Oasis by Seaport Stays. The 63-room Seaport Suites, one block south of Byrne Plaza, will house three different entertainment venues conceptualized by **DJ Jason** Weiss - FOURCAST Day Club, Vyce and Fairview Social (a nod to the legendary Fairview Club, located on the same footprint), along with an exclusive pool, two outdoor bars and the Beach Brew Coffee Shop. The Oasis, several blocks north at 2911 New Jersey Avenue, features 38 upscale condo and townhouse rentals with a central leisure and recreation area, pool, kids' splash pool and more.

All Seaport properties offer free service to Seaport Pier and sister properties via the Seaport Shuttle... It's hard to believe that MudHen Brewing Co. is already celebrating its 5th anniversary. Owners Brendan & Robin Sciarra are marking the occasion with the addition of a new division, MudHen Hospitality. The subsidiary's signature project is the new Hen Houses at 156 E. Taylor Avenue, an enclave that features the rescued and renovated MudHen Manor, neighbored by six smaller, rental homes with names based on MudHen brews - Baker's Double, Captain Doug's, Wildwood Haze, Sea Tiger, Holly Beach and 1883... Speaking of rescues, for quite some time, the landmark Oceanview Motel in Wildwood Crest looked like a goner. The property had fallen into disrepair and was considered by many to be a lost cause before Madi-

son Resorts arrived on the scene. The company purchased the ailing motel and promptly announced a massive, two-phase \$12 million renovation project that would include the addition of a 5th floor with suites, a restaurant, room updates, a modern cafe, lounge area, firepits, infinity pool, cabana and a wedding venue. Unfortunately, the motel's soaring mid-century lobby was deemed structurally unsound and could not be saved, but a faithful rebuild will be included in the renovation. At press time, Madison Resorts was not yet ready to announce an opening date... Similarly, though the building was not in danger of facing the wrecking ball, Hotel Cabana has dramatically renovated and reopened the building at 21st & Boardwalk. This entity, originally the King's Inn Motel, has operated under a variety of names and identities over the past decade, including Howard Johnson, Quality Inn and Hammock Inn & Suites. The property has been completely modernized with all-new rooms and amenities, and looks to be a prime player in the island's hotel renaissance.

Back to the Boardwalk

While the biggest story on the Boardwalk is the refurbished Boardwalk itself, there is once again no shortage of new businesses dotting the famous wooden way this spring. At the same time, we say "farewell" to some old favorites... We start this year on the northern end, at Montego Bay Resort, where Bar Fore Sports Simulator brings the "virtual reality" golf simulation to the island. State-of-the-art programs include additional sports and games, in a bar and lounge setting ideal for social gatherings and parties... At 22th Street, Quinn's Original Fudge Island takes over for the Original Fudge Kitchen (which has maintained its store down at Roberts Avenue). Owner John Quinn, who worked at Fudge Kitchen for over

30 years, brings with him a wealth of experience and his own unique recipes at this completely renovated location, which he intends to operate year round... Next door, Seaport Village Shore Decor & More takes over for longtime favorite Rapunzel's (now at 2305 New Jersey Ave), offering a variety of nautical-themed signs, candles and gifts, along with other specialty items. It is the sister store of Villa Gourmet (which opened last summer), and, yes, the name echoes the memory of the old Seaport Village Shopping Pier, which sat directly opposite, where Seaport Pier is today. At the other end of the block is the aforementioned Hotel Cabana, which puts in perspective just how much change the 2200 block has seen over the past year... Giovanna's Hispanic Restaurant at 2416 is under new ownership and has undergone an expansion to accommodate later parties... Winterwood Christmas Shoppe, a fixture between Glenwood and Magnolia Aves, is out, replaced by a second location of beachwear shop **Bikini** Heaven... One of the Boardwalk's

With the vision of creating better beach access, and with the support of grant money, residents, state, county, and previous and current administrations, Phase 1a and 1b were completed, with Phase 2 of the beach access decks project, partially funded by the CMC Open space program and NJ DCA/DOT, ready to bid, with a hopeful summer completion.

Amenities include:

ADA showers, New decks, railings, ramps, Bike racks, Benches, Planters, and Shade pergolas

Phase 3+ awaits approval and will be north of Rambler along the bike path.

The Wind and the Whales

According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), a record number of large whale deaths were reported along the coast between December '22 & February '23, as pre-construction work ramped up for offshore wind farms. The wind farms, while an integral component of the nation and New Jersey's climate change policy, raised questions about a possible connection between the whale deaths and offshore wind activities. On January 30th, a group of 30 New Jersey mayors, including North Wildwood Mayor Patrick Rosenello, constructed a letter requesting a suspension to all offshore wind activity.

On March 16th, **Congressman Jeff Van Drew** held a hearing entitled "An Examination into Offshore Wind Industrialization" gathering testimonies from a panel of experts. It was livestreamed and can be found on Youtube.

MORE BEACH PROTECTION

After a 10-year wait, the Hereford Inlet to Cape May Inlet Dune and Beach Berm construction project is supposedly moving forward. North Wildwood, Wildwood, Wildwood Crest and Lower Township signed state aid agreements to permit the Shore Protection Project. The \$82.4 million plan is funded by US Army Corps of Engineers and Dept. of Environmental Protection (DEP.)



The construction of new features at the **Byrne Community Center Complex** began, with the intention of the site serving as a wellness destination for people of all ages and capabilities appealing to residents and visitors. Included in the construction is a fitness track and an outdoor exercise area with equipment stations. **Mayor Pete Byron**, who remarked the current track is 20 years past its life expectancy, described the track that will be installed as "truly a community track."

"This is a tremendous project that will put the Byrne Community Center Complex on the map as a premier destination for health and wellness. The City is thankful for the partnership with the County and the Open Spaces Program that is making it possible." said Byron.

The Byrne Community Center Complex project received a \$2.9 million Open Spaces grant, with an added \$1.19 million award to finish the development being projected in 2023.

HISTORY & THE HEN HOUSES

Way back in 1883, the first passenger train carried travelers from the mainland onto the island, traversing a precarious bridge over the untamed marshlands. Nicknamed the "MudHen," it battled and clawed its way through the elements; often, it was washed out during high tide. History recounts the path it blazed, opening up new worlds of opportunity for inhabitants and visitors of what would become the Wildwoods.

In the very same spirit, the MudHen Brewing Company burst onto the scene in the Spring of 2018 at 127 W. Rio Grande Avenue. The brew-pub had become the jewel in the crown of the Taylor Avenue Sciarra family of businesses, which includes **Kona Surf Company, Dogtooth Bar & Grill and Poppi's Brick Oven Pizza**. The growing conglomerate is the brainchild of **Brendan Sciarra**, whose father, **Mike Sciarra**, founded Kona in 1969 in a little storefront along Pacific Ave.

MudHen is a complete brewing and distribution facility, full service bar and restaurant, crafted out of a the shell of a "Neo Doo Wop" building that formerly housed a Harley Davidson dealership. Today, it's hard to believe that MudHen is already celebrating its 5th anniversary. Owners **Brendan & Robin Sciarra** are marking the occasion with the addition of a new division, **MudHen Hospitality** with their new **Hen Houses** at 156 E. Taylor Avenue, an enclave "micro-resort" that has completely transformed and beautified the neighborhood.

With this particular project, the historic **Reese/Spuhler** Home was beautifully restored to its original glory and beyond, renamed Mudhen Manor. It was originally built in Classical Revival style in the 1890s by John Reese, a retired Philadelphia iron manufacturer. He worked as a ship chandler (ship supplies vendor), a highly profitable and influential career in the socioeconomics of the booming fishing industry. The house was built near the curb, but moved to the center of the property between 1949 and 1956. Between those years, it was bought by Esso Service Station owner Joe Spuhler for his family.

We caught **up with our Irish** (real and honorary) friends at the Irish Festival, extended our summer fun (thank you, Mother Nature), witnessed falling leaves and ultimately falling temperatures. We made our Christmas Wish Lists (ocean view always a popular request), attended the Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony (in search of a sandy Santa) and welcomed a new year by the sea. Road construction and Boardwalk replenishment were a much-needed "winter staple," as we prepared for the Summer of 2023.

NORTH WILDWOOD LEGAL WOES Sadly, a significant amount of beach

and dune was lost again this winter. On December 6, 2022, NJDEP filed a lawsuit in the Superior Court seeking to direct the City of North Wildwood from constructing a desperatelyneed bulkhead to guard the City from the continuing beach erosion. In response, the City explained the imperativeness of constructing the bulkhead and included a proposal for a counterclaim asking the Court to award the city \$20 million in damages resulting from NJDEP's failure to support proper shore safety to North Wildwood's beaches and dunes. Fortunately the city was given permission at the eleventh hour of the week leading into Memorial Weekend to regrade the dunes and eliminate the unsafe conditions and carry on with the project. Unfortunately, there has been no beach replenishment project this year. Please respect what small amount there is to share.

WE ALL SCREAM FOR ICE CREAM!

North Wildwood City Council granted its first ice cream vendor contract under a bid system to Aladdin's Beach Enterprises LLC, of Bellmawr, NJ the highest bidder at \$140,000, for the 2023 summer season.

In November 2022, Mayor Patrick **Rosenello** said current license holders would still be able to sell ice cream until their retirement. City Clerk Scott Jett stated that the 10 licenses, restricted to military veterans and volunteer firefighters, cost between \$800 and \$900 each. The city was advised it could foresee a considerably higher amount of revenue by putting the license out to bid, which could be acquired as a block, and, in accordance with Ordinance 1891, required that the successful bidder be a military veteran or a member of the Anglesea Vol. Fire Co. or N. Wildwood Fire Co. Aladdin's business partner, Jeffrey Cunningham, provided proof of military service.
