

Mix thoroughly.


Pour into well greased pans or tube pan.

When the winter winds blow and the days feel long, there's a simple way to add a bit of joy and activity to the season-sharing the holiday spirit with our feathered friends. Families across the country have found that trimming a tree outdoors with edible ornaments is not only a cheerful tradition but also a wonderful way to bring nature right to the doorstep.

A peanut garland is a favorite for many birds, especially blue jays and woodpeckers. Simply thread peanuts (still in their shells) with a strong needle and sturdy string, and drape the garland across a tree branch. Pinecones make excellent ornaments as well—spread them with peanut butter, roll them in seed, and hang them up with a loop of twine. The result? A lively scene as flocks

gather to enjoy the handmade feast.

Of course, not all holiday leftovers go to waste. Fruitcake, often the punchline of holiday humor, proves to be a delicacy in the bird world. Placed in a suet feeder, it draws woodpeckers, mockingbirds, and jays in droves. Some even bake special fruitcake variations with nuts and dried fruit just for their backyard visitors—but often the post-holiday leftovers are more than enough to keep the birds happy.

These simple traditions bring color, life, and laughter to the quiet winter landscape. As the birds flock to the branches, their chatter and flutter remind us that the holidays aren't just for us—they're for sharing with all creatures great and small.




The Dennisons Leave Ireland for America They Settled in Holly Beach











By the 1860s, the Dennisons were settled on West 5th Street with four children filling their small home. Bridget's brother lived with them too, a reminder of the ties that bound them to Ireland. When the Civil War broke out, James answered the call, serving as a private in the Union Army, leaving Bridget to keep the household together.

Two decades later, in 1880, the family was living on Passyunk Avenue. Their youngest, John, was still at home—a boy who would one day carry the family name into a new chapter.

When Bridget was widowed, she surprised everyone by leaving Philadelphia behind. By 1900, she had taken her grandson Walter and moved to Holly Beach, New Jersey, to work as a summer housekeeper. The ocean air and wide, sandy beaches captured her heart. She bought a little cottage on Leaming Avenue, her name appearing in the Holly Beach tax books for nearly two decades. She received a soldier's widow's discount, but the true reward was finding a new life by the sea.

Her son John soon followed. Married to Catherine Stack, he brought his growing family to the island. The children, once city-born, now spent their days climbing holly trees, building forts, and running barefoot in the sand. More children were born in Wildwood, their laughter and voices weaving into the rhythm of seaside life.

John worked hard to provide for his family. In Philadelphia, he had been a cabinetmaker and store clerk, but in Wildwood he turned to whatever jobs the young resort town offered—carting luggage from the train station with a donkey, helping at the Culver & Dennison Clothing Store, and finally, earning the steady job of letter carrier for the U.S. Post Office. When he passed away in 1928, and Catherine in 1934, they left behind not only a family but also a legacy deeply rooted in island soil and sand.

The Dennisons had become part of Wildwood's story. Generations later, their descendants are still here, still feeling the pull of the ocean that once captured Bridget's heart.

EPILOGUE

Walter (1896) married Mae Connors. Their daughter, Doris, and her family continue to return to Wildwood, keeping summer traditions alive.

John Jr. (1898), a Wildwood High track star and football player, died tragically at just 16.

Joseph (1899) returned safely from WWI, but his son Joe Jr. was killed in WWII at the Battle of the Bulge, his grave resting in Hawaii's National Cemetery of the Pacific. Joseph's other son, Terrence, went on to a remarkable aviation career, recognized internationally.

Jane (1901) worked as a telephone operator in Wildwood and Philadelphia but died young at 46.

Anthony J. Dennison, Sr.(1905) married Jeanette Dooley April 20, 1931. They had one son Anthony John (Jack) Dennison, Jr. A.J. Sr. was an Asco Market (Acme) manager on the island.

There were at least four stores. He managed the Cedar Avenue store and the one few people know of at 6501 New Jersey Avenue, Wildwood Crest. The building is still there. Their son Jack (married Patricia Hannahan). He had a long and distinguished career in technology working with RCA and GE. He was born at Long's Maternity Home in Wildwood and lived in North Wildwood on Hereford Inlet until his death in 2021 —. Many of the locals knew him as the father of Jeannie Dennison Yecco who taught at Crest Memorial School. She also was a reporter for the Gazette Leader.

Mary Cathleen Dennison (1910) Married Edwin S. Nesbitt at Saint Ann's Church on Pacific Avenue October 1938. They owned and operated many businesses on the island. Their first was a bakery on Pacific Avenue where everything was served on blue depression glass. They also owned Nesbitt Sales Furniture for more than fifty years. Edwin was a long time Mayor of Wildwood Crest, Board Member of Marine National Bank and General Manager of the Cape May County Bridge Commission (Ocean Drive). Mary was a devoted member of the original Saint Ann's Parish. She was a member of the Via Crucian's which consisted of five women from St. Ann's

that were active in the construction of the Assumption Church in Wildwood Crest.

Cathleen Nesbitt Smith current owner of Junkin Treasures and all around entrepreneur of many businesses in NJ. Patricia Nesbitt Nagel owned the Flying Dutchman Motel and Office Services.

James Francis (1912) worked in real estate and local government, while

Leo (1915), the youngest, lived only to 23, remembered for his kind heart and early passing.

From a brave teenage girl stepping onto American soil in 1850 to a family whose name still echoes in the Wildwoods, the Dennison story is one of resilience, belonging, and a love for island life. Their story, like the holly trees they once planted, has taken root and grown deep in Wildwood's sandy soil.







Beth Judah Temple Marks Historic Milestone with Gala Weekend Celebration

Beth Judah Temple, a cornerstone of Wildwood's Jewish community for over a century, celebrated a milestone on May 18 with a Legacy Luncheon honoring its recent listing on the New Jersey State Historic Register as well as to the National Register of Historic Places.

In the Weiner Auditorium, congregants, dignitaries, and friends gathered for a warm welcome from Susan Maslow, remarks by Temple President Morey Edelman and Mayor Ernie Troiano Jr., and blessings from Rabbi Ron Isaacs. Guardians of Light Awards went to the Gidding and Satt families for decades of service. Gail Cohen unveiled plans for a Museum and Library in a former Hebrew school classroom to safeguard the temple's rich history.

Beth Judah's roots trace to Jewish immigrants from Woodbine, NJ—an agricultural colony founded in 1891 by philanthropist Baron Maurice de Hirsch to help Eastern European Jews escape persecution. Drawn by opportunity, families settled in Wildwood, holding their first High Holiday services in 1911 and founding the congregation in 1915. The cornerstone of Beth Judah was laid in 1929.

Over the decades, the temple expanded with a post-WWII social hall, the 1965 Rebecca and Morris Green Annex, and outreach to Jewish Coast Guard recruits. It has weathered wars, economic downturns, and even a Ku Klux Klan presence in the 1920s, standing as a symbol of perseverance, faith, and community pride.

Sunday's celebration honored that legacy while looking forward—ensuring Beth Judah's story will continue to inspire for generations.



The original "Double Mint Twins" models on television in the 1950s, were the grandchildren of Hereford's Keeper Ferdinand Heizman. Their mother was Grace, daughter of the Keeper. She lived in the Lighthouse as a child and went to Margaret Mace School.



In the first floor middle hallway, by the back door, there is a noticeable repair patch on the wood floor. Late one evening in the early 1940's when Robert O'Neal was Keeper, the weights that are part of the clockwork system that turned the Fresnel Lens broke loose from their steel cable and crashed through the second floor, through the first floor and down into the basement.

The original cleanup and refurbishing of the abandoned, deteriorating lighthouse occurred late 1982 – 86. The authentic historic restoration took a longer period of time- 1998 – 2011.



The decorative piece of iron on the outside of the north facing chimney is called a "wall anchor", its purpose being to help secure the chimney to the building.



The 1878 "Atlas of The New Jersey Coast" states that at the time of writing of the Atlas "There are only two families living on the Five Mile Beach (full time). The Lighthouse Keeper's family and one other". (Probably at the Taylor Drewes House on the 200 block of East first Ave.) read the story on p.29



While at its original location before being moved, there was a short unpaved road called Park Avenue in front of the Lighthouse.



The Fresnel Lens on display at Hereford is the second lens used a top the Lighthouse. No record of where the original went.

The Fire That Couldn't Stop Sam's

TWENTY YEARS AGO, on December 9, 2005, the biting cold winds of early winter gave way to something far more devastating—a blaze that would go down as one of Wildwood's worst fires in history. Reported in The Sun, the inferno ignited around 2:30 that Friday afternoon, raging for 18 relentless hours and consuming two beloved boardwalk landmarks: Sam's Pizza Palace and the Shore Plaza.

The loss was heartbreaking. For generations of families, Sam's wasn't just a pizza palace—it was tradition, laughter, and the taste of summer itself. Yet even as smoke still hung in the air, plans were already being made to rebuild. Wildwood has always had a way of rising from the ashes, and Sam's was no exception.

Just five months later, on Memorial Day Weekend 2006, Sam's Pizza reopened—bigger, brighter, and stronger than ever. Crowds poured onto the boardwalk, drawn by that unmistakable aroma and a sense of joy that no fire could extinguish.

Now, as Presidents Weekend 2026 approaches, Sam's Pizza prepares to open for its 69th season. It's become something of a winter miracle—when the boardwalk, quiet and wind-swept all winter long, suddenly bursts back to life. For many, it's the unofficial start of the season... and a reminder that some Wildwood traditions are simply too strong to fade.

Late Saturday, an excavator had come and probed through the ruins like a ravenous giant insect, slightly obscene in this collapsed palace of laughter and expectant appetite, rooting among the smoke and soot and twisted debris, sifting time itself back to happier days of sun and light.

Now, the front teeth are gone from the smile of the Boardwalk, there at that 26th Street dogleg that is its true epicenter, the fulcrum on which the dreams of generations hover like the wisps of smoke from the ruined simple blessed pizzeria now before us.

But the day will come, it will come ... and I will have a slice with sausage again.

And a small birch.



She looked at me and asked softly, "Oh, what tribe was she?"

I shook my head. "Oh, no—she just knew I collected them."

"Really?" I said, amazed. "Would you mind holding this for a moment? That would make it even more special."

She smiled gently. "Sure. And would you mind if I spoke some Indian language over it?"

"That would be wonderful," I said.

She held the point in her hand and began to chant softly in her native tongue. When she finished, she said, "That's the prayer they sang on the Trail of Tears for those who had recently departed."

I was awestruck. "Wow. Thank you so much. That really makes this point very special."

As she handed it back to me, I asked her name. "Cynthia," she replied, before asking mine.

"David," I said.

Her eyes widened. "I have a son named David!"

To this day, I keep that point in a special display with three others I found that same afternoon—and with another I discovered exactly one year later, in the very same spot on the beach.

To the extrovert in Donna, it felt like the party had ended too soon, leaving the town and its beaches too quiet.

And yet, there was a small, introverted part of her that loved this quieter pace. She'd find herself on

a nearly empty beach alongside locals grateful for the break from summer shoobies, or smiling when she spotted a couple in their sixties playing "Spirit in the Sky." It was its own kind of magic.

This morning, Donna sat at the kitchen table, writing a paper at a calm, unhurried rhythm, keeping time with the steady crash of waves across from her window. September slowed everything down, made space for reflection—but it also left room for longing.

She missed her family. She missed her mother. This was their place, the heart of seven generations who had loved and vacationed on this little island.

Next year, Donna promised herself, she would rent a place for two weeks and invite her kids to come and go as they pleased. She wanted to celebrate finishing school with a long, relieved exhale in her home away from home—and she wanted them with her.

No matter where life took her, Donna knew her heart would always belong to Wildwood, that small, beloved stretch of sand and sea.








During wartime, when resources were scarce and every family did their part, the Neill family of North Wildwood planted a Victory Garden. Around 1942, the Neill clan of 11 were often found in the garden with their mother at Granny Hankins' house, nestled between 3rd and 4th on New Jersey Avenue—on the very ground where the Wawa once stood and where Beach Bums sits today.

The late Charlie Neill, who so often shared his family's stories, remembered those long days in the garden. He could still feel the weight of the shovel as he turned the soil, and he never forgot how much he disliked the endless weeding. Yet there was pride in the harvest. His mother carefully canned the ripest tomatoes, filling jars that would feed the family throughout the year, especially at Sunday dinners.

It was called a "Victory Garden" because in those days gasoline was scarce, and not everything could be delivered to the island. Growing your own vegetables meant one less thing that had to make the journey by truck or ferry. Neighbors shared their produce, trading what they had and ensuring no table went empty.

It was a time when community spirit thrived, and the Neills, like so many others, showed how resilience and togetherness could turn even the hardest seasons into ones of abun-

Every old house truly tells a story... Jake's is living proof.



THE FIRST HOUSE STILL STANDS TALL

The story of North Wildwood's first house is more than dates and deeds—it is a tapestry of lives lived boldly, of families who carried both hardship and hope. From John Taylor's clapboard dream to the Drewes' sweet traditions, and finally to the Browns' legacy of service and sacrifice, the home 208 E. 1st Avenue has stood as witness.

Long before boardwalk lights glittered against the ocean, before roads or rails brought visitors to the island, there was John Taylor. Other than the native American Indians, he is remembered as the first true resident of the fishing hamlet once called Anglesea—a rugged stretch of sand and marsh that would, in 1906, take the name North Wildwood.

Taylor arrived in the 1870s, even before the Hereford Lighthouse rose at the northern tip of the island. With his sons, he set the rhythm of early life here—casting pound nets off the beach and rowing passengers across the inlet to the mainland, since there was no bridge or train to carry them.

Amid a scattering of crude fishing shacks, Taylor built something more enduring: a Gothic-style cedar clapboard house at 208 E. 1st Avenue, believed to be the very first true home in North Wildwood, dating to about 1874.

In 1908, Taylor sold the house to Charles and Liza Drewes for \$500. The Drewes brought not only their family but also a sweetness to the island—operating the very first ice cream parlor in North Wildwood. When The Sun visited in 2004, we stepped inside the home of Janet Brown, who proudly kept their memory alive. She pointed to the large crocks once used by the Drewes to churn ice cream by hand, and in the corner, a treasured heir-loom: a hand-painted wooden chest carried across the Atlantic when the Drewes sailed from England, their lives packed tightly inside.

The house itself remains a storyteller. Its blue picket fence still greets the sea breeze; flowering bushes and old shade trees soften its weathered frame. On the porch rests a horse trough that harks back to Taylor's era. And up in the attic window, Janet's playful touch endures—a small cat doll gazing out toward the ocean, watching as generations come and go.

Like Father, Like SonCourageous War Heroes





For Janet (1919-2016) and her husband, Lt. Larry Brown, USAF (1916–2002), their old house was more than a relic of history. It was home. Retiring here in 1981, the couple filled its rooms with love, carrying both joy and sorrow within its walls.

Larry's own story carried the weight of history. A World War II pilot, he flew 35 missions in Flying Vixens between 1942 and 1945, and before the war's end, trained under Gen. Doolittle in preparation to fly the formidable B-29.

Their son, James W. Brown, U.S. Army Green Beret, carried that same courage into the Vietnam War. Enlisting in 1968, James endured the unimaginable. On his second tour, his regiment was struck by a grenade—he was the only survivor. Though he made it home, the wounds of war followed him, and his life was cut short. James was laid to rest with full honors at Arlington National Cemetery, a hero remembered.
